ISLEWORTH

The tower is situated at the west end of the church. Access to the ringing room on the second floor is via a stone spiral staircase located in the south east corner. The room is small (really?) with a 20 ft high ceiling; it contains one window: some peal boards. There are clock hammers (from the copy of enquiry form it looks like 15 clock hammers – need confirmation) and a set of handbells with the tenor size of 16.

The belfry is located on the second floor of the tower accessed via a staircase. The bells are hung in an 'H' section steel frame on two tiers, the 2nd and 4th bells are accommodated on the top level. The frame occupies the whole space. All the bells have roller bearings and metal headstocks. A lantern on the top of the roof used to house the 'Saints' bell: this bell is now hung dead above the ten bells and can be used for striking the hours of the clock. In the early 1970's an automatic electric winding mechanism was installed.

In 1962 a sound control system was installed.

The ten bells are rung in full circle.
