West tower is three-storeyed of Kentish rag with diagonal buttresses and a stair turret reaching up higher than the battlemented top of the tower. Nikolaus Pevsner *The buildings of England: Middlesex* 1950 p. 158.

Has a restored 15<sup>th</sup> century tower, mediaeval bell (probably by J Sanders, 16<sup>th</sup> century) Sir Clifford Radcliffe *Middlesex*.

1647. Parish fined for not ringing bells for Charles I. J A Trollope Bell ringing in the Middle Ages *Ringing World* 1940 p.280 at 281. Copy in suspension file.

January 8, 1769 was rung a compleat peal of 6160 changes of Bob Major in 4 hours and 2 minutes by Enos Redknap Jr., James Hart, Enos Redknap Sr., Joseph Redknap, Benjamin Barber, John Cole, John Goose, John Taylor. Called by John Cole. Also:

December 28 1749 Twickenham Scholars 6000 Bob Major in 3h 50m William Rolls, Thomas Tibbs, Enos Redknap, Robert Holmes, John Taylor, Henry Cowley, James Webster, James Hunt. *Church bells* vol. 2 p. 451.

On September 20<sup>th</sup> 1674 it was ordered that bells were not to be rung "but according to a declaration, under my Lord Chief Justice's hand, how he says they may be legally ringed" From parish registers. E Walford *Village London* 1985 (originally published 1883/84 as *Greater London*)
