Ringing world March 17th 1972 p. 215; December 15th 1939 p. 744; February 10th 1989. Transcribed from slip. No indication of content.

On Friday 4th inst. 8 members of ASCY rang a muffled peal here as a mark of respect for W Hopcraft who met his death by drowning on December 26 1877. *Church bells* January 12th 1878, vol. 8 p. 63. Presumed to be a "peal" in the loose sense i.e. touch.

Foundation stone 1715, consecrated 1729.

Thomas Dunn, mason James Grove, carpenter Samuel Worrall, carpenter Isaac Mansfield, plasterer John Darby, carver Gervase Smith, carver.

Church repaired 1836, struck by lightning 1841. B F L Clarke Parish churches of London pp. 155-6.

On Ash Wednesday, February 17th 1836 this tower was burnt by fire. The 12 bells, and clock with chimes, most of the interior masonry and all the woodwork from the ceiling of the vestry room were entirely destroyed. By the spontaneous liberality of the parishioners and a few others, and by effectual application of their contributions this damage was substantially repaired, with very inconsiderable [sic: considerable?] outlay of Parish funds.
