

TWICKENHAM ALL HALLOWS. Sources

Height of tower about 85 feet. (Lombard Street) *Ringling World* January 8 1943

The tower built of stone has a cornice and parapet to complete it, its height being about 85 feet. *Ibid?*

Tower from All Hallows, Lombard Street (C. Wren 1694). Bells: ten from St Dionis Backchurch. Tenor 1732, others 1736 (two recast) LMAS *Transactions* vol. 18 (1955)

The original ten bells of All Hallows Lombard Street have been installed at All Hallows, Twickenham. The Rededication Service took place 11th March 1951. *Ringling World* March 16 1951 p. 168.

Organ originally built by Renatus Harris 1695. David Baker *The organ* 1991 p. 83 *PN: Presumably the first edition, not the second of 2003.*

Twickenham trebles on way to Windsor. *Ringling World* December 11 1987 p. 1085. *Copy in suspension file.*

...Two trebles sold to St John the Baptist Windsor and removed from the tower on Monday 8th August 1988. The two new trebles were hung for ringing 11th August 1988. *Ringling World* November 11 1988. *Includes table of weights, dates and founders of the ten bells. Copy in suspension file.*
