

## RULES.

I.—The Association shall be called "The Middlesex County Association and London Diocesan Guild of Change-Ringers." It was formed on June 7th, 1897, by a union of the Middlesex Association and the South and West Middlesex Guild, and these Societies are hereinafter known as the North and East, and South and West Districts of the County Association.

II.—Its objects are (1) the recognition of the true position of Ringers as Church Officials; (2) the due care and use of Church Bells and Belfries; and (3) the cultivation of the art of Change-Ringing.

III.—The government of the Association shall be vested in a Committee (hereinafter referred to as the Central Committee) consisting of the following members, of whom five shall form a quorum, viz:—

- (a) The Bishop of the Diocese, who, being a member, shall be ex-Officio Patron of the Association.
- (b) The President, Master, Secretaries and Treasurer of the Association.
- (c) The Vice-Presidents, Masters, Treasurers and Secretaries of each District of the Association.
- (d) Three members elected annually by each District, as hereinafter provided. The President, Master, Secretary and Treasurer of the Association shall retire annually at the Annual General Meeting, but shall be eligible for re-election, provided always that the District Secretaries for the time being may, if thought fit, be at the same time Joint Secretaries of the Association.

IV.—The Association shall consist of Honorary and Ringing Members. Honorary Members shall subscribe not less than 5s. annually, or by a donation of not less than £1 1s. become Life Members. Such Members may be admitted by the Secretaries at any time. Ringing Members shall pay an Annual Subscription of 1s. 6d., and all subscriptions shall become due on January 1st in each year. A Life Subscription of 5s. may, however, be accepted from non-resident Members in lieu of the annual payment of 1s. 6d.

V.—The following expenses shall be paid by the Treasurer of the Association out of the moneys to be remitted to him by the Treasurer of each District, as hereinafter provided, viz:—

- (a) The expenses of the Annual Meeting.
- (b) The fees and expenses of representatives of the Central Council.
- (c) The travelling expenses of the Central Committee.
- (d) The cost of printing the Annual Report.
- (e) Postage, Stationery, and other incidental expenses.

VI.—No person shall be admitted as a Ringing Member if he belongs to a band, till he be certified by the captain of his band to be a change-ringer or desirous of learning change-ringing—or if he does not belong to a band, till he be recommended to the Central Committee by two Ringing Members of the Association; but any person duly certified or recommended as aforesaid, shall be admitted as a Ringing Member at any General or District Meeting of the Association.

VII.—The Annual General Meeting of the Association shall be held on the Saturday in Easter week, for the purpose of electing officers, transacting business, and for united practice in change-ringing. At such Meeting a report of proceedings, and a statement of accounts shall be presented, and the place of the next Annual General Meeting fixed. All other General Meetings may be arranged by the Central Committee, and the times and places of ensuing District Meetings shall be arranged by the District Secretaries, as empowered by a majority of Members present at the last District Meeting held.

VIII.—That any person wishing to attempt a peal may be proposed, seconded and elected in the tower, provided there be a majority of members present. The conductor of the peal shall be responsible for collecting the subscription of the newly-elected member previously to the attempt being made, and shall at once report the election to the Secretary in whose District the peal is attempted, in order that the same may be ratified at the next District Meeting.

IX.—Members whose subscriptions are more than one year in arrear, shall be deemed to have withdrawn from the Association.

X.—The chief endeavour of the Association being to instil greater reverence for God's House and worship among its members, any member misconducting himself may be dismissed at the discretion of the Central Committee, who shall report the same to the Annual General Meeting, and, in the event of his dismissal, such member shall forfeit any payment which he may have made to the Association.

XI.—No alteration in or addition to these Rules shall be made except at an Annual General or Special Meeting of the Association, and notice of any proposed addition or alteration, or of any motion relating to any other matter in connection with the Association, must be sent in handwriting at least twenty-one days before one of such meetings.

## RULES FOR THE DISTRICT SOCIETIES.

I.—Each District Society shall hold a meeting not later than the second Saturday in February in each year for the election of its Officers and representatives on the Central Committee of the Association, and shall be at liberty to manage its own business, collect its own subscriptions, and publish its separate Balance Sheets.

II.—The District Secretaries shall receive all subscriptions in their Districts, and remit them to the Treasurer. They shall also satisfy themselves, by personal inspection or otherwise, as to the state of Belfries and Bands in their Districts, and make a yearly report for presentation to the Central Committee.

III.—The Treasurer of each District shall remit to the Treasurer of the Association 60 per cent. of the subscriptions received by him from his District Secretary, the remainder of such subscriptions being retained by the District for its own use.

IV.—Each band of Ringers in the Association shall appoint a Local Secretary, who shall collect the subscriptions, and with whom the General Secretaries shall correspond.

V.—There shall be a Committee in each District, consisting of (a) the representatives of the District on the Central Committee of the Association, and (b) one representative from each tower in the District in union with the Association. These Committees shall meet from time to time for the transaction of any business affecting the District not provided for in the foregoing Rules.

VI.—Bands desirous of employing an instructor should apply to one or other of the District Secretaries, who will endeavour, so far as funds permit, to meet their wishes.

## REPORT, 1930.

THE 33rd Annual General Meeting, which was held at All Saints' Church, Fulham, on April 26th, was overshadowed by the then recent death of the President, Mr. F. A. Milne. This was referred to at length in our last report; and a further tribute is paid to his memory in our obituary notices.

The meeting had to elect his successor, and we feel that members, in unanimously choosing the Rev. W. P. Cole-Sheane as their President, have done well for the Association. Since his ringers at Twickenham became affiliated he has taken a great interest in our art, and in this he sets an excellent example to the Clergy generally. As Rural Dean of Hampton we may confidently rely on him to look after the bells in his Deanery, and as our President we may rest assured that the interests of the Association will be his first consideration.

The revival of interest shown in the meetings in recent years continued during 1930, which is most encouraging to those responsible for arranging them. North and East District members held meetings at Southgate, Finchley, Enfield (St. Mary's), Stanmore, Hendon, Clapton, and South Hackney, the attendances averaging 42. In addition, a practice meeting was held at Homerton in mid-week, and the usual joint meetings with the Herts and Essex Associations were arranged. These were at North Mimms and Edmonton, the latter being a meeting of the three Societies.

The meetings in the South and West District were again well supported. They were held at Isleworth, Ealing (Christ Church), Ruislip, Staines (St. Peter's), Hillingdon (St. John's), Acton and Chiswick. The attendances averaged 35. Joint meetings with the London County Association and The Oxford Diocesan Guild were held at Lambeth and Wraysbury respectively.

We are glad to record a satisfactory increase in our membership, which now stands at 875, the highest number yet attained by the Association. During the year we elected 3 Honorary and 73 Ringing members in the N. and E. District, and 1 Honorary and 32 Ringing members in the S. and W. District. An entirely new band has been formed at St. Andrew's Enfield, and Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Fletcher are acting as instructors with satisfactory results. This tower has become affiliated to the Association, as also has the tower of St. Lawrence, Brentford. The band at St.

Marks, Dalston, after an anxious time, has now become firmly established under the leadership of Mr. C. Randall. The efforts of Mr. G. Kilby are bearing fruit at Ruislip, where progress is being made.

The ringers at All Saints, Poplar, have however signified their desire to withdraw from membership, and that tower has consequently been withdrawn from the list of affiliated towers.

As regards the peal performances we are glad to record a peal of Grandsire Triples rung at St. Andrew's, Hillingdon, by a local band, conducted by Mr. F. Corke. It is 20 years since the previous peal by the St. Andrew's ringers was rung on these bells. Another very similar performance was the first peal rung on the Harrow Weald bells, one of Bob Minor conducted by Mr. G. R. Goodship. Of the five local ringers who took part, four rang their first peal.

At the other end of the scale the outstanding performance was a peal in eleven Surprise Major methods, spliced, rung at St. Giles-in-the-Fields on July 24th. The conductor was Mr. W. Pye, who also conducted a peal of Spliced Superlative and Cambridge Surprise Maximus at Southwark Cathedral on January 11th. A very smart handbell performance was the peal of Double, Plain, and Little Bob Major, spliced, which Mr. E. M. Atkins called on August 13th. Mr. Atkins also conducted the Association's first peal of Little Bob Royal, which was rung on handbells on June 27th. Mr. E. C. S. Turner called the first peals of Double Bob Major and St. Clement's Triples by the Association at Ealing (St. Mary's) and Ealing (Christ Church) on May 21st and July 14th respectively.

A peal of Stedman Triples by a band of "Williams," a peal of Bristol Surprise Major by a band of "Georges," and a peal of Grandsire Triples by a band of Policemen are also worthy of special note. In connection with the latter, Inspector Bottrill is to be congratulated on the success of his efforts to form a Police Guild.

The total number of peals rung was 69, six of which were rung on handbells. The peals on Church bells were rung in 33 different towers.

In all, some 187 members took part in the peals, ten of whom rang their first peals, whilst there were 84 other members who accomplished something new. Four members rang their first peals of London; four their first peals of Bristol; five Cambridge Royal; and one, spliced in four Surprise Major methods.

The number of conductors was 25, a rather higher figure than usual, and Mr. G. R. Goodship appeared in this list for the first time.

Our usual record of bell restoration work is a small one. The ten bells at St. Dunstan's, Stepney, have been re-hung by Messrs. Mears and Stainbank, who have also retuned and rehung the peal

of eight bells at St. Lawrence Jewry. The contract for the augmentation of the Isleworth bells has been placed with the Whitechapel firm, and we have every reason to hope that the long looked for peal of ten in that part of the county will soon be in existence. A movement is also on foot to add two trebles to the Harrow Weald peal of six bells.

In connection with the hanging of bells, a most interesting and valuable contribution was given by the President of the Central Council, Mr. E. H. Lewis, at the last meeting of that body, when the Towers and Belfries report was discussed. As two of our affiliated towers were specially mentioned by Mr. Lewis, we have reproduced his speech in this report.

We offer our sincere sympathy to our old friend, Mr. T. Beadle, whose failing health confines him to his bed, and we wish him a complete recovery.

Our grateful thanks are given to all whose work as instructors is doing so much to keep the Association going. This sort of work goes on apparently unnoticed, but it is none the less appreciated in spite of that. The self-imposed task brings its own reward, the goodwill of one's friends. The late Robert Holloway's devotion to his duty as a Churchman and a ringer is an example to us all. It was well said of him at the unveiling of a memorial peal-board at Acton on November 8th, "that he served his generation according to the will of God, and has fallen asleep." May we all deserve a similar tribute.

To conclude, we once more thank our Hon. Secretaries for their untiring work on behalf of the Association. To repay them, let us not forget that they, who arrange the many meetings, also appreciate a good attendance, and then let us do OUR best to attend.

## CENTRAL COUNCIL NEWS.

(Reprint from "Ringing World," July 11th, 1930.)

### AN INTERESTING EXPERIMENT.

The President, Mr. E. H. Lewis, in a valuable contribution to the Towers and Belfries Committee's report, said that during the year two interesting cases had come up as far as he was concerned. One was the case of Barnet, where the architect had asked for information as to the amount and direction of the forces set up by ringing the bells in the tower. That was the first time he had heard of an architect asking this question, which was the first question any architect should ask when he had anything to do with the rehangings of the bells. He (the President) thought that was a step in the right direction. There was another interesting point. The architect himself suggested a reinforced concrete sill round the tower, built into the wall, to carry the frame and make sure that all the forces set up by ringing the bells were properly transferred to the tower as a whole and not to odd stones in the tower. The architect asked him to design a suitable beam. He got out the design and had it checked by a firm associated with his company, and he believed that beam was now in place. It was a continuous reinforced beam right round the tower built into the walls with strengthening pieces across the corners. Another matter which came before his notice was from the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings. They were considering a frame in which, while some of the bells swung in the usual way, parallel to the walls of the tower, others swung diagonally. The Society asked the question on a general principle was it an advantage to arrange for bells to swing diagonally in a tower or the contrary? That raised an interesting question. It was some seventeen years, he believed, since he gave the Council a general statement on the problem as it then stood, and he would like to restate that to some extent now. They knew now what were the forces which they had to guard against, and they knew that those forces should be transferred to the tower, in the most rigid possible way spread as far as possible over the whole of the walls. The amount of the forces was not really serious because it was, generally speaking, less than the wind pressure on that portion of the tower above the bells in any reasonably stiff wind, so that the actual force, if properly transferred, was not at all serious. The danger was in the period of these forces—because they were regularly recurring forces—getting in tune with the natural beat of the tower at which it swung normally as an elastic body. In this case they might get a much greater movement of the tower gradually built up, and that might do very

serious harm to the tower. One thing that could be done to guard against this was to be sure that the direction of the forces was so arranged that the tower should best stand up to them—that was to say, that the direction was that which would give the least movement of the tower. In a perfectly symmetrical square tower, the stiffness diagonally from north-west to south-east was exactly the same as the stiffness from north to south or from east to west. There was no getting away from that, provided that the actual masonry of the tower was sound, so that the tower was a whole piece of masonry and not separated into parts by a series of cracks.

### EFFECT OF OPENINGS IN TOWER WALLS.

There were, however, no towers completely symmetrical, uniform and without openings in the walls, so they had to consider the question of towers where parts of the wall were cut away. The relative stiffness of any section of a tower could be accurately calculated. He would not go into details as to how it was done, but it was quite simple. Let them, however, take as an example a tower 14ft. square inside, with walls 3ft. thick. If they cut away 10ft. of the east and west walls, as in the case of a western tower with an open arch and west window, the stiffness of that section of the tower from north to south was reduced to nearly 1/50th part of what it would be if the walls were continuous all round, and the stiffness east to west would be one-half of what it was with the walls continuous all round. With the stiffness in one direction reduced to about 1/50th and in the other direction to about one-half, the diagonal stiffness was less than one-third of what it was in the original complete tower. If they went a little further and assumed a tower arch opening and west window opening 14ft. wide, so that they had walls left on the north and south sides 20ft. long and 3ft. thick, the stiffness of the section east and west was about two-fifths, and the stiffness north and south was less than one-hundredth part of the complete section of the tower. He mentioned that as a practical example, because it was one of the commonest types of tower which they met with, and seemed to show that the heavier bells should be hung to swing east and west, if they wanted them to swing against the greatest stiffness. When they came to buttresses and other portions of the church which supported the tower, the problem became more complicated, but still to a large extent could be calculated. If to the tower which he had given as an example they put at each corner two buttresses 3ft. wide and 2ft. in depth they increased the stiffness by approximately 50 per cent. and if in that case they had a 10ft. opening in the north and south walls, they would bring the east and west stiffness back to the figure of the original complete tower without buttresses. The north and south stiffness would be about twice what it was without buttresses. It

was only right to point out that in certain particular cases a section of a tower might be stiffer in a diagonal direction, as in the case of Northaw. There the tower rests on two walls, one on the west and one on the south side, with a single pillar in the north-east corner, and it had been confirmed by measurement that the tower was stiffest in the north-west to south-east direction, the actual movement of the tower in different directions varying directly as the force applied, and inversely as the calculated stiffness. These principles had been applied to Barnet tower, which has been somewhat damaged by the way in which the bells were arranged to swing, and partly, it was alleged, by the heavy traffic on the roads on each side of the fork where the church stands. This would be more serious on account of the comparatively shallow foundations, and also probably on account of the natural water level in the ground being lowered by drainage, which in these days was more elaborate than formerly. The two heaviest bells originally swung on the west side of the tower in a north and south direction, and the ropes were hung on opposite sides of the wheels, so that they got the worst possible arrangement for the tower. It was difficult to do anything much in the way of re-arranging the bells in the frame, but the whole frame was being turned ninety degrees, so that the tenors would swing east and west next to the north wall of the tower, and he would be looking forward with considerable interest to the result in regard to the movement of the tower when the bells have been so rehung.

## In Memoriam.

Members lost to us by death during 1930.

HENRY A. BARNETT.—Died September 27th, on the eve of his 74th birthday. He was an original member of the Association, and for 56 years had been a ringer at All Hallows, Tottenham. Of a genial disposition, he was very well liked by his brother ringers, and was a fairly regular attendant at Association meetings. Of the 19 peals he rang for the Association, he conducted one.

WILLIAM J. DELL.—Died August 15th, after an illness which lasted about two years. He also was a member of the Association since its inception, and for many years was Hon. Auditor in the North and East District. He had been a ringer at St. Mary's, Monken Hadley, for some 40 years, and had taken part in twelve Association peals.

HARRY DYAS.—Died October 10th, after being knocked down by a motor vehicle some ten days earlier. He was tower-keeper at St. Andrew's Church, Wells Street, W.C., and had been a member of the Association since 1918. He rang in two peals for the Association.

FRANK A. MILNE.—Died February 5th, aged 75 years. He was Hon. Treasurer of the Association from its commencement, and President since 1924. Reference to the work he did for the Association was made in our last report. He rang in 28 Association peals. A peal with the clappers half muffled was rung as a memorial on the day of his funeral.
