WOKING

## RULES.

I.—The Association shall be called "THE MIDDLESEX COUNTY ASSOCIATION AND LONDON DIOCESAN GUILD OF CHANGE-RINGERS." It was formed on June 7th, 1897, by a union of the Middlesex Association and the South and West Middlesex Guild, and these Societies are hereinafter known as the North and East, and South and West Districts of the County Association.

II.—Its objects are (1) the recognition of the true position of Ringers as Church Officials; (2) the due care and use of Church Bells and Belfries; and (3) the cultivation of the Art of Change-Ringing.

III.—The government of the Association shall be vested in a Committee (hereinafter referred to as the Central Committee) consisting of the following members, of whom five shall form a quorum, viz. :—

- (a) The Bishop of the Diocese, who, being a member, shall be ex-Officio Patron of the Association.
- (b) The President, Master, Secretaries and Treasurer of the Association.
- (c) The Vice-Presidents, Masters, Treasurers and Secretaries of each District of the Association.
- (d) Three Members elected annually by each District, as hereinafter provided. The President, Master, Secretary and Treasurer of the Association shall retire annually at the Annual General Meeting, but shall be eligible for re-election, provided always that the District Secretaries for the time being may, if thought fit, be at the same time Joint Secretaries of the Association.

IV.—The Association shall consist of Honorary and Ringing Members. Honorary Members shall subscribe not less than 5s. annually, or by a donation of not less than £1 is. become Life Members. Such Members may be admitted by the Secretaries at any time. Ringing Members shall pay an Annual Subscription of 1s. 6d., and all subscriptions shall become due on January 1st in each year. A Life Subscription of 5s. may, however, be accepted from non-resident Members in lieu of the annual payment of 1s. 6d.

V.—The following expenses shall be paid by the Treasurer of the Association out of the moneys to be remitted to him by the Treasurer of each District, as hereinafter provided, viz. :—

- (a) The expenses of the Annual Meeting.
- (b) The fees and expenses of representatives of the Central Council.
- (c) The travelling expenses of the Central Committee.
- (d) The cost of printing the Annual Report.
- (e) Postage, Stationery, and other incidental expenses.

VI.—No person shall be admitted as a Ringing Member if he belongs to a band, till he be certified by the captain of his band to be a change-ringer or desirous of learning change-ringing—or if he does not belong to a band, till he be recommended to the Central Committee by two Ringing Members of the Association; but any person duly certified or recommended as aforesaid, shall be admitted as a Ringing Member at any General or District Meeting of the Association.

VII.—The Annual General Meeting of the Association shall be held on the Saturday in Easter week, for the purpose of electing officers, transacting business, and for united practice in change-ringing. At such Meeting a report of proceedings, and a statement of accounts shall be presented, and the place of the next Annual General Meeting fixed. All other General Meetings may be arranged by the Central Committee, and the times and places of ensuing District Meetings shall be arranged by the District Secretaries, as empowered by a majority of Members present at the last District Meeting held.

VIII.—That any person wishing to attempt a peal may be proposed, seconded and elected in the tower, provided there be a majority of members present. The conductor of the peal shall be responsible for collecting the subscription of the newly-elected member previously to the attempt being made, and shall at once report the election to the Secretary in whose District the peal is attempted, in order that the same may be ratified at the next District Meeting.

IX.—Members whose subscriptions are more than one year in arrear, shall be deemed to have withdrawn from the Association.

X.—The chief endeavour of the Association being to instil greater reverence for God's House and worship among its members, any member misconducting himself may be dismissed at the discretion of the Central Committee, who shall report the same to the Annual General Meeting, and, in the event of his dismissal, such member shall forfeit any payment which he may have made to the Association.

XI.—No alteration in or addition to these Rules shall be made except at an Annual General or Special Meeting of the Association, and notice of any proposed addition or alteration, or of any motion relating to any other matter in connection with the Association, must be sent in writing at least twenty-one days before one of such meetings.

*NOTICE.—The Central Committee will be happy to assist the Clergy in framing Rules for the proper management of their Ringers and Belfries.*

## RULES FOR THE DISTRICT SOCIETIES.

I.—Each District Society shall hold a meeting not later than the second Saturday in February in each year for the election of its Officers and representatives on the Central Committee of the Association, and shall be at liberty to manage its own business, collect its own subscriptions, and publish its separate Balance Sheets.

II.—The District Secretaries shall receive all subscriptions in their Districts, and remit them to the Treasurer. They shall also satisfy themselves, by personal inspection or otherwise, as to the state of Belfries and Bands in their Districts, and make a yearly report for presentation to the Central Committee.

III.—The Treasurer of each District shall remit to the Treasurer of the Association 60 per cent. of the subscriptions received by him from his District Secretary, the remainder of such subscriptions being retained by the District for its own use.

IV.—Each band of Ringers in the Association shall appoint a Local Secretary, who shall collect the subscriptions, and with whom the General Secretaries shall correspond.

V.—There shall be a Committee in each District, consisting of (a) the representatives of the District on the Central Committee of the Association, and (b) one representative from each tower in the District in union with the Association. These Committees shall meet from time to time for the transaction of any business affecting the District not provided for in the foregoing Rules.

VI.—Bands desirous of employing an instructor should apply to one or other of the District Secretaries, who will endeavour, so far as funds permit, to meet their wishes.

## REPORT, 1929.

**B**EFORE dealing with the work of the Association during 1929, it is our sorrowful duty to refer to the great loss we have sustained by the death of our late President, Mr. F. A. Milne, who died on February 5th of the present year. He had only been ill for about two months, during which time he patiently bore a painful and fatal malady, from which there was no hope of recovery. The funeral on February 8th at Barnet was attended by several members of the Association, including four of the officers and committee, as well as by Canon G. F. Coleridge, President of the Central Council, and one of Mr. Milne's earliest friends. A half-muffled peal was rung at St. Mary's, Hadley, after the interment.

Mr. Milne was born at Hadley on July 5th, 1854. He was educated at Winchester College, and afterwards at Oxford. Whilst at the university he was Hon. Secretary of the Oxford University Guild of Change Ringers, a society then in its early years. He distinguished himself by being the first student in the university to take a first class in jurisprudence, and later on he was called to the bar and practised at Lincoln's Inn. He became a Justice of the Peace for Hertfordshire in 1918, and for Middlesex in 1925. By his efforts in 1876 the four bells at Hadley were augmented to six, and it is still fresh in our memories that the octave at that church was completed in 1921 by the addition of two trebles, one of which Mr. Milne gave in memory of his mother and father, and the other as a memorial to his only son, Capt. Alexander Milne, who was killed at St. Julien in 1917.

His activities in connection with our own Association have been of great value. In 1889 he assisted in forming the Middlesex Association, which was established at Finchley on September 7th, with the towers of Barnet, Edgware, Finchley, Hadley, Hendon and Tottenham, in affiliation. He was the first Hon. Secretary of that organisation, afterwards becoming Hon. Treasurer. In 1897, on the formation of the present society by the amalgamation of the Middlesex Association with the South and West Middlesex Association, Mr. Milne was elected Hon. Treasurer, a position he held until his death. Although he was always a very busy man, he spent a great deal of his time in furthering the interests of the Association, and in 1924 he was unanimously elected President, an honour which he greatly appreciated. He represented the society on the Central Council for the last six years. His special qualities brought him into prominence, and he was elected on a committee appointed to enquire into the legal relations between ringers and church authorities. The report of this committee was presented by Mr. Milne at the last meeting of the Council, and is reproduced in this report. The Council, as well as this Association, is much the poorer by his death.

The 32nd Annual Meeting was held in the City on Saturday, April 6th. The towers of Bishopsgate (8), St. Magnus, Thames Street (10), and Cripplegate (12), were open for ringing, and some 90 members enjoyed some very good practice on the bells in these churches. The service was held at St. Botolph's, Bishopsgate, when the sermon was preached by the Rev. A. Lombardini.

At the business meeting the whole of the retiring officers were re-elected, whilst Mr. F. Corke was chosen to fill the vacancy on the Central Council which arose through the lamented death of Mr. Robert Holloway.

Meetings were held in the North and East District at **Edmonton; Stamford Hill; Clerkenwell; Pinner; Harrow Weald; Northaw; St. Olave's, Hart Street; and Upper Clapton.** The meeting at St. James', Clerkenwell, was held in connection with the reopening of the bells, and there was a record attendance of some 120 members and friends present. Three other meetings were attended by 50 or more members, which is a very encouraging feature, and the average reached the very satisfactory figure of 46. Mid-week practice meetings were held at **Willesden; Dalston; and Homerton.** In the South and West District several attractive meetings were held at **Isleworth; Christ Church, Ealing; St. Andrew's, Hillingdon; Feltham; Ruislip; St. Peter's, Staines; Twickenham; and Heston;** the attendances at these meetings averaging 41.

In addition to the above, several joint meetings with neighbouring Associations were arranged. The North and East District met the Hertfordshire Association at Hadley in July, and a few weeks later visited Hertford, where a meeting of the Essex, Hertford and Middlesex Associations had been convened. Some 80 members of the three societies attended this meeting. South and West District members issued invitations to three of their neighbours, and enjoyable meetings resulted. The Oxford Diocesan Guild came to St. John's, Hillingdon, in April; the Guildford Diocesan Guild visited Sunbury in June; whilst the London County Association joined us at St. Mary's, Ealing, in November. The enthusiasm displayed at these meetings amply repaid the secretaries for the trouble taken in arranging them.

During the year we elected one honorary and 78 ringing members in the North and East District, and 5 honorary and 17 ringing members in the South and West District. Despite these exceptional figures, our total membership, which now stands at 840, has not greatly increased. There are, no doubt, many difficulties in the way of retaining members who lack enthusiasm, but we again urge upon local secretaries the need to keep in touch with members of their bands, especially in the case of removals, and of making every effort to keep them in the Association. An entirely new band has been formed at Clerkenwell, and is receiving tuition, so far with good results. The band at St. Ann's, Stamford Hill, has been considerably augmented, and is already making progress. We regret, however, that the band at St. Olave's, Hart Street, has withdrawn from membership.

The peal list is of greater interest than usual. One peal of Grand-sire Triples, rung at Staines in December, 1928, which was omitted from last year's report, is included in our statistics for the present year. In all 70 peals were rung, amongst them being several worthy of more than passing notice. From a purely scientific standpoint, the outstanding performance of the year was the peal of Spliced Surprise Major in ten different methods rung at Willesden on August 13th. The concentration of mental energy necessary to bring this peal to a successful issue was enormous, and it was not accomplished until several attempts had been made. This peal had been preceded on March 19th by one in six Surprise Methods, both being conducted by Mr. W. Pye, and the Association can proudly point to having rung peals in four, five, six, and ten Surprise methods, far surpassing anything done by any other society.

First peals in various methods by the Association were rung as follows: Pudsey Surprise Major at Broxbourne on January 26th; Rutland Surprise Major at Willesden on February 5th; and Double Norwich Court Bob Royal at Westminster on September 7th. Eight policemen rang a peal of Cambridge Surprise Major at St. George's, Southwark, on May 25th, the conductor being Det.-Constable H. J. Poole, of Leicester. We congratulate the force on attaining its ambition of ringing a Surprise peal. The 100th peal by the Association on the Willesden bells was rung on April 16th.

Of individual performances, mention should be made of a peal of Bob Minor rung at St. Ann's, Stamford Hill, on March 9th, by Mr. T. G. Deal, at the age of 81; and of a peal of Grandsire Triples at Pinner on July 6th, which was the first by Messrs. T. Humphreys and C. Lord, aged 67 and 72 respectively!

Miss E. E. Chapman and Miss F. E. Orr rang in the first peal of Pudsey Surprise by the Association mentioned above; Mrs. R. J. Wilkins rang her first peal of London Surprise Major at St. Matthew's, Upper Clapton, on February 27th; and Miss K. M. Bradford rang her first peal at Twickenham on April 27th. Sixteen members rang their first peals, and 68 rang new methods to peals. In all some 178 members took part in the peals, which, with the exception of one on handbells, were rung in 36 different towers. Twenty-one members shared in the conducting, Mr. E. J. Goater for the first time appearing in the list. The peal of Cambridge Surprise Maximus rung at Southwark Cathedral on June 15th was the 1,000th by Mr. W. Pye for the Association.

The quarter-peal list, which is given elsewhere, shows a decline in the total number rung, which is to be regretted. There are, however, signs of progress in the list. Quarter-peals at Pinner, Ruislip, and Upper Clapton are encouraging features, as are a number of 720's rung at Harrow Weald, Hendon, Hornsey, Northaw, and Stamford Hill. It is satisfactory to note that on Armistice Day two 720's of Bob Minor were rung at Harrow Weald by an entirely local band for the first time.

As far as bell restoration work is concerned, Messrs. Gillett and Johnston have recast the eight bells at St. James', Clerkenwell, and

have rehung them in new fittings with strengthened framework. Clapper controls have been added to the treble, second, and tenor bells. The same firm have recently rehung the whole peal at St. Botolph's, Bishopsgate, and have rebuilt the iron frame on new steel foundations. Messrs. John Taylor and Co. have rehung the peal of eight at St. Mary Magdalene, Holloway, with new fittings. Messrs. Mears and Stainbank have refitted the eight bells at Heston in ball bearings, and have also added two trebles to the existing six at St. Olave's, Hart Street, the old bells being rehung with completely new fittings. This firm also have in hand the rehung of the bells at St. Lawrence, Jewry, E.C., and St. Dunstan's, Stepney.

The fund which is being raised for the augmentation of the Isleworth bells now stands at a total of £140, and further subscriptions are earnestly solicited.

Congratulations to the Rev. A. H. F. Boughey, an esteemed Vice-President, on attaining his jubilee in the Presidency of The Cambridge University Guild; to Mr. H. A. Barnett, of Tottenham, on reaching his 50th year as a ringer at that church; and to Mr. W. Webb, of Finchley, who in 54 years has not missed ringing in the New Year in his own tower.

The retirement of the Rev. W. H. Davies, of St. Giles-in-the-Fields, has lost us a very good friend, and we wish him every happiness.

The failing health of Mr. T. Beadle is still a matter of concern. A practical method of showing sympathy for him in his long illness resulted in a sum of just over £20 being forwarded to him from his many friends, through the Hon. Secretary of the South and West District.

After serving us well for five years, Mr. N. A. Tomlinson has resigned from the Mastership of the North and East District. We thank him sincerely for his services, and wish him every happiness in his recent marriage. The vacancy arising through his resignation was filled by the election of Mr. A. W. Coles, who has already done a great deal of useful work in the Association. Mr. F. Corke succeeds to the position of Master of the South and West District, under the new arrangement in that district of electing a new Master annually. We congratulate Mr. Goodfellow, the retiring Master, on a successful year.

We again express our sincere thanks to the many members who have acted as instructors during the past year. This work is of the utmost importance, and members able to assist the Association's officers in this respect should get in touch with the Hon. Secretaries, who will be glad to find them something to do to help forward the progress of the Association.

We also desire to acknowledge the invaluable services rendered to the Association by the joint Hon. Secretaries. A great deal of their work is done silently and unseen. We can best show our appreciation of their efforts by supporting them at Association meetings and by prompt payment of subscriptions.

## Central Council News.

Reprint from "The Ringing World," dated June 21st, 1929.

### THE LAW AFFECTING CHURCH BELLS.

The Legal Committee (Messrs. J. S. Pritchett, F. A. Milne and E. W. Elwell) presented the following report, which was read by Mr. Milne:—

The sole right of access to the belfry is vested in the incumbent (Blunt, ed. 1921, 273), but the incumbent's rights are not given him for his sole use, and he must permit access to the belfry to allow of such use of the bells as is consistent with the purpose for which they are placed there (Blunt Book of Church Law, ed. 1921, 328), e.g., summoning parishioners to worship or tolling at a funeral, which is an essential part of the rites of the Church.

The bells should only be rung with the incumbent's consent, and they must not be rung against his express wish. The property in the bells, as in other church ornaments, is in the churchwardens (Whitehead Church Law, sub-tit. "Bells," 1921 ed. p. 42); hence it was formerly held that a churchwarden could not be convicted of stealing a bell. The churchwardens have the custody of the keys of the belfry, and are to take care that the bells are not rung without proper cause; but the minister conjointly with them is to be the judge of the proper cause. They would seem, therefore, to have a right to interfere in the belfry and in the ordering of the ringers, but in what manner or to what extent it is difficult to define. For the custody of the keys implies that the belfry is to be open or not at their discretion, and the property of the bell ropes is in them (Jackson v. Adams, 1835, 2, Bingham p.c. 402), and if the bells were improperly rung, the churchwardens according to Canon 88 would be the responsible parties. But the churchwardens are not authorised without the consent of the incumbent to give orders for the bells to be rung, and it would be an ecclesiastical offence if they were to break open the belfry door in order to have the bells rung, for the freehold of the church is in the incumbent, and the lawful custody of the key of the church belongs to him, so that unless he consents the parishioners cannot, except on the occasion of divine service, procure the ringing of the bells. Should they break in and ring the bells they would be guilty of an ecclesiastical offence, and if proceedings should be taken against them by the incumbent they would be mulcted in costs (see Redhead v.

West (1862) 6, L. Times 580, and Cripp's Law of Church and Clergy, ed. 1921, p. 190, 1921).

The Parochial Church Council's Measure (1921), while leaving the property in the goods and ornaments of the church (which, of course, includes bells, bell fittings and bell ropes) in the churchwardens, transfers to the Parochial Church Council all the powers, duties and liabilities of the churchwardens relating to the care, maintenance, preservation and insurance of such goods and ornaments. The Parochial Church Council is the body to be first approached, if anything goes wrong with the bells, and it is its duty, so far as may be possible, to put things right. So far, however, as the ringing of the bells is concerned, it would seem that the Parochial Church Council Measure has made no alteration in the law, and that, save in so far as ringing for the church services is concerned, it remains with the incumbent to decide if and when and subject to what conditions the bells shall be rung, the churchwardens still having the same indefinite right of interference.

As it rests with the incumbent to appoint all church officers other than those as to whom special provisions are made by Ecclesiastical Law and the Parochial Church Council Measure of 1921, e.g., churchwardens, sidesmen, parish clerk and sexton, it would seem that every regular ringer should be appointed or approved by him. In every well-regulated belfry the ringers are formed into Guilds or Societies subject to regulations approved by the incumbent, and there is practically no difficulty in the matter. But on every change of incumbent it would be advisable that the rules for the time being in force should be submitted to and formally approved by him. The Parochial Church Council have no voice in the matter, any more than they have in the appointment of organist, but if any remuneration is to be made by the Council to the ringers for their services it is obviously the duty of the incumbent to keep the Council informed on all matters relating to the ringing of the bells.

This raises the question as to who is responsible, if anyone, for the safety of the ringers and for compensation in case of injury. So far as all ringers are concerned, it is the duty of the church authorities to see that the bells, bell chamber and fittings are reasonably safe, and that there is nothing in the nature of a trap whereby an incautious person might meet with injury. It is possible that if the incumbent was aware that the bells could not with safety be rung, and with that knowledge permitted ringing to take place, he might be civilly liable in damages for any injury sustained. The same would apply to any person who left a bell "up" and without warning invited a stranger into the belfry or (as in a case within the writer's recollection) omitted to close a trap door in the belfry and anyone fell through. Such things are, of course, very unlikely to happen, but it may sometimes occur that a ringer is accidentally injured without blame attaching to anyone. In such a case, if he was a paid ringer, the question of compensation under the Workmen's Compensation Act would arise. There would then be contract of service with an employer, who would be the person liable to pay. Who was the employer would be a ques-

tion of fact which would largely depend upon who paid the money. It might be the incumbent, the churchwardens or the Church Council who enlisted the band of ringers or arranged the terms of payment. Whoever it was would probably be held liable. The Church Council, however, being a corporate body, its members would not be personally liable, and the Council itself only to the extent of moneys in hand.

With regard to bells generally, a faculty is required for their removal, alteration (such as recasting) or erection. The granting of a faculty for a new peal of bells is by no means a matter of course. The Chancellor will hesitate where there is a risk of annoyance being caused by their being rung with unnecessary frequency or for an unnecessary length of time, and this should be carefully borne in mind when a new peal is in contemplation, especially where there is a crowded population.

The ringing of church bells is almost of necessity an annoyance to some people, however pleasing it may be to others. It cannot, therefore, ever be held a public nuisance rendering the ringers criminally liable on indictment, but it may be a private nuisance liable to be restrained by injunction at the instance of any person specially aggrieved (*Soltau v. de Held*, 2. Sim. 133). There is, however, no reported case in which an injunction has been granted to restrain the ringing of the bells of a parish church, and so long as bells are rung in moderation, even for peal ringing—it is unlikely that the Courts will interfere with such an old-established custom, however much it may annoy individuals who reasonably or unreasonably hold church bells in abhorrence.

In reply to a question, Mr. Elwell said he thought it was quite clear that the Factory Acts did not apply to church bells.

The report was adopted.

## IN MEMORIAM.

MEMBERS LOST TO US BY DEATH DURING 1929.

**GEORGE ALLDER.** Died April 28th, aged 71 years. He was an original member of the South and West District, and for many years represented unattached members on the district committee. Although a ringer at Burnham, Bucks, he took a great interest in the work of this Association, especially in the earlier years of our existence. He rang in four Association peals.

**WILLIAM STAGG.** Died March 14th, at the age of 68. He was a member of the band at Christ Church, Ealing, and joined the Association in 1920. Although not a peal ringer, he was very keen, and most assiduous in his Sunday duties.

**JOHN F. STILWELL.** Died March 9th, at the advanced age of 82. He was an honorary member since 1903. He had been Vicar's warden at St. John's, Hillingdon, for 27 years, and defrayed the entire cost of recasting and rehangng the old ring of eight at that church in 1911, besides adding two trebles. He was a great lover of bells, and by his death we lose a sincere friend.

**JOSEPH E. SYKES.** Died in March, at Copenhagen, Denmark. He met his death in very tragic circumstances whilst engaged in the gas works in the Danish capital. His home was at Marsden, Yorkshire, but he had, however, belonged to the Association since 1905, when he joined as a member of the All Saints', Poplar, band. He rang eight peals during his period of membership, two of which he conducted, but one of the latter afterwards turned out to be false.

**ROBERT THOMPSON.** Died April 14th, aged 54 years. Although he only joined us as recently as 1925, he proved himself a valuable member. He was a capable conductor, and a regular ringer at the Ealing Churches of St. Mary and St. Stephen. He rang in six Association peals.

**REV. HERBERT WILSON.** Died July 15th, at the age of 81. He was Rector of Harlington, and at the summer meetings of the Association at his church always gave the members a hearty welcome. He had been an hon. member since 1923, and will be much missed.
