HENDON

The tower is situated at the west end of the church which is of c10th century origin.

The open ringing area is large with the ceiling of about 25 ft high. This is one of the few towers in the London Diocese where the bells are rung from the ground floor, at the back of the church, in full view of the congregation. There is one clock hammer in this area and one window. The clock is above the ringing area in a separate room. A staircase provides access to the belfry on the second floor

The canons are retained on the 6^{th} and 7^{th} bells.

The bells are hung on two levels. The top tier of steel accommodates the treble, 2nd and 4th bells whilst the remaining five bells hang in the lower wooden tier. This construction occupies the whole space. All the bells have metal headstocks and are hung on roller bearings. The baffles on three sides of the belfry act as the sound control system.

The bells are rung in full circle.
