The cupola, which is also a feature of two other nearby churches, contains one bell which is no longer in use. We know from a petition in the Court of Requests, probably of the year 1559 against Lawrence Wright, bellfounder, of London, concerning a badly cast tenor bell, that in the reign of Queen Elizabeth there were five bells in the tower, but the first mention of bells in the surviving parish records dates from 1676 when new bell ropes cost "11s. 6d." In 1731 the six existing bells were made into eight at the cost of £500 at the charges of two parishioners, William Harrington, Yeoman, and Richard Ashley, Baker, who had to find sureties; but the bells appear to have been recast by Pack and Chapman of Whitechapel in 1776 and some were again recast by Wm. Mears of Whitechapel in 1787. In 1911 the old beams had become unsafe and were removed, being replaced by a steel bellframe and two more bells added, making a very fine peal of ten. The total weight of the peal is nearly four and three quarter tons, the tenor being a little over twenty-two hundredweight, Sit Clifford Radcliffe *Middlesex*.
