# THE SOLEMN CONSECRATION OF THE NEW RING OF 12 BELLS

#### NOTES ABOUT THIS SERVICE

he ritual for the consecration of bells has been in use in the Church for nearly twelve hundred years. The form and order of this service is based on the traditional *Pontifical Blessings* of *The Old Roman Service Books* and is focused on five rites. These may only be carried out by the Bishop or by a Priest who has been specifically empowered. We are delighted that Bishop Richard will be here to conduct this ancient ceremony.

# 1. The Washing of the Bells

The bells are washed with holy water (which was blessed earlier in the day). The water is a reminder that anything or anyone who is used in the service of God is to be pure and clean. Prayers of exorcism are used to address the evil influences of the air ... the phantoms, the storms, the lightning ... which threaten the peace of devout Christians who come to the church to sing the praises of God.

## 2. The Anointing of the Bells

The bells are anointed with the Oil of the Sick (*Oleum Infirmorum*), which was earlier blessed in St Paul's Cathedral. The sign of the cross will be signed on the front of each bell signifying the cleansing of the bells to prepare them for baptism.

#### 3. The Baptism of the Bells

The bells are anointed with the Oil of Chrism, which was also blessed earlier at St Paul's. This is the part where the bells are sanctified and consecrated by the Bishop. Today the sign of the cross will be signed on the rear of each bell.

#### 4. The Incensation of the Bells

The bells are censed both on the outside by the Bishop administering the thurible, and on the inside cavity by the Priests. The incense reminds us that we are in the presence of God breathing the air of heaven.

#### 5. The Chanting of the Gospel

The Gospel passage that concerns Mary and Martha is, as is dictated by the *Pontifical Blessings*, chanted by the Deacon.

The St Magnus Choir, under the direction of Tom Kennedy, has been joined by members of the London Ringers' Choir. The Organist is John Eady. The "Blessing of the Bells" litany and antiphon was composed by Joseph Atkins and is performed this evening for the first time. The Trumpeter is Crispian Steele-Perkins and the Handbell Ringers are Past Masters of the Ancient Society of College Youths, conducted by Paul Mounsey.

#### **FIRST LESSON**

#### 1 Kings 8: 22-30.

Read by Dickon Love, Trustee Secretary of the St Magnus the Martyr Bells Fund and Tower Keeper

And Solomon stood before the altar of the LORD in the presence of all the congregation of Israel, and spread forth his hands toward heaven: And he said, LORD God of Israel, there is no God like thee, in heaven above, or on earth beneath, who keepest covenant and mercy with thy servants that walk before thee with all their heart: Who hast kept with thy servant David my father that thou promisedst him: thou spakest also with thy mouth, and hast fulfilled it with thine hand, as it is this day. Therefore now, LORD God of Israel, keep with thy servant David my father that thou promisedst him, saying, There shall not fail thee a man in my sight to sit on the throne of Israel; so that thy children take heed to their way, that they walk before me as thou hast walked before me. And now, O God of Israel, let thy word, I pray thee, be verified, which thou spakest unto thy servant David my father. But will God indeed dwell on the earth? behold, the heaven and heaven of heavens cannot contain thee; how much less this house that I have builded? Yet have thou respect unto the prayer of thy servant, and to his supplication, O LORD my God, to hearken unto the cry and to the prayer, which thy servant prayeth before thee to day: That thine eyes may be open toward this house night and day, even toward the place of which thou hast said, My name shall be there: that thou mayest hearken unto the prayer which thy servant shall make toward this place. And hearken thou to the supplication of thy servant, and of thy people Israel, when they shall pray toward this place: and hear thou in heaven thy dwelling place: and when thou hearest, forgive.

#### THE WASHING OF THE BELLS

The bishop will proceed to sprinkle the bells with Holy Water that was blessed before the service, moving to the back of the church. The choir will sing verses from Psalm 146.

# THE ANOINTING OF THE BELLS

Bishop: O God,

who through Blessed Moses, the law giver,
Thy servant, didst prescribe that silver trumpets
should be made, through which when
sounded by the priests at the time of sacrifice,
the people, reminded by their sweet strains, would
make ready to worship Thee, and would assemble to
offer sacrifices and encouraged to battle
by the clangor of these same trumpets, would
overcome the onslaughts of their enemies, grant,
we beseech Thee, that these vessels,
prepared for Thy Holy Church, may be sanctified by
the Holy Ghost, so that, through their
touch, the faithful may be invited to a reward.

And when their melody shall fall upon the ears of the people, may they receive an increase of Faith; may all the snares of the enemy, the crash of hail-storms, hurricanes, the violence of tempests be driven far away; may the deadly thunder be weakened, may the winds become salubrious, and be kept in check; may the right hand of Thy strength overcome the powers of the air, so that hearing these bells they may tremble and flee before the standard of the holy cross of Thy Son depicted upon them, to Whom every knee bows of those that are in Heaven, on earth, and under the earth, and every tongue confesses that our Lord Jesus Christ, swallowing up death upon the gibbet of the cross, reigneth in the glory of God the Father and the Holy Ghost, world without end. Amen.

*Bishop:* Would the sponsors please move to your bells.

Sponsors move from their seats to stand behind their bell. The Bishop's party moves to the treble bell at the back of the church and addresses the sponsor who is standing behind it:

*Bishop:* What name does this bell bear?

Sponsor: This bell is given for the Glory of God and in memory of Sheila. Lord Bishop,

it is to be named Michael.

The Bishop makes a cross on the waist of the bell with the oil of the sick.

Bishop: Sancte Michael ora pro nobis Choir: Sancte Michael ora pro nobis,

Sonate super urbem Londinii et trans flumen Tamesis

The party moves on to the 2nd bell and the rite is repeated:

Bishop: What name does this bell bear?

Sponsor: This bell is given for the Glory of God and in memory of Douglas and Mary

Bradshaw, Norman and Esther Maycock. Lord Bishop, it is to be named

Margaret.

Bishop: Sancta Margareta ora pro nobis

The party then moves on to the 3rd bell while the choir sings the prayer of the bell.

Bishop: What name does this bell bear?

Sponsor: This bell is given for the Glory of God and in memory of Olive Rogers and the

London County Association (late the St James' Society). Lord Bishop, it is to

be named Thomas.

Bishop: Sancte Thomas Cantuarensis ora pro nobis

The party then moves on to the 4th bell while the choir sings the prayer of the bell.

*Bishop:* What name does this bell bear?

Sponsor: This bell is given for the Glory of God and in memory of Charles and Jessie

Kippin. Lord Bishop, it is to be named Mary.

Bishop: Sancta Maria ora pro nobis

The party then moves on to the 5th bell while the choir sings the prayer of the bell.

Bishop: What name does this bell bear?

Sponsor: This bell is given for the Glory of God and in memory of Air Commodore John

Stanley Mason and Winifred Lucy Mason. Lord Bishop, it is to be named Cedd.

Bishop: Sancte Cedd ora pro nobis

The party then moves on to the 6th bell while the choir sings the prayer of the bell.

*Bishop:* What name does this bell bear?

*Sponsor:* This bell is given for the Glory of God. Lord Bishop, it is to be named Edward.

Bishop: Sancte Edwardus Confessor ora pro nobis

The party then moves on to the 7th bell while the choir sings the prayer of the bell.

*Bishop:* What name does this bell bear?

*Sponsor:* This bell is given for the Glory of God. Lord Bishop, it is to be named

Dunstan.

Bishop: Sancte Dunstan ora pro nobis

The party then moves on to the 8th bell while the choir sings the prayer of the bell.

*Bishop:* What name does this bell bear?

*Sponsor:* This bell is given for the Glory of God. Lord Bishop, it is to be named John.

Bishop: Sancte Johannes Baptiste ora pro nobis

The party then moves on to the 9th bell while the choir sings the prayer of the bell.

Bishop: What name does this bell bear?

Sponsor: This bell is given for the Glory of God and in memory of William Pye. Lord

Bishop, it is to be named Erkenwald.

Bishop: Sancte Erkenwald ora pro nobis

The party then moves on to the 10th bell while the choir sings the prayer of the bell.

*Bishop:* What name does this bell bear?

Sponsor: This bell is given for the Glory of God and in memory of Michael Hughes-

D'Aeth and Charles and Jennie Mounsey. Lord Bishop, it is to be named Paul.

Bishop: Sancte Paulus ora pro nobis

The party then moves on to the 11th bell while the choir sings the prayer of the bell.

*Bishop:* What name does this bell bear?

Sponsor: This bell is given for the Glory of God and in memory of Henry Yevele,

interred in this church. Lord Bishop, it is to be named Mellitus.

Bishop: Sancte Mellitus ora pro nobis

The party then moves on to the tenor bell while the choir sings the prayer of the bell.

*Bishop:* What name does this bell bear?

*Sponsor:* This bell is given for the Glory of God. Lord Bishop, it is to be named

Magnus

Bishop: Sancte Magnus ora pro nobis

At the end, the antiphon is sung

*Choir:* The voice of the Lord is upon the waters:

The God of majesty hath thundered.

Psalm 29 (3)

The sponsors will return to their seats.

# THE BAPTISM

The Bishop will return to the back of the church and visit each bell in turn beginning with the treble. He will make a cross with the oil of chrism on the rear of each bell saying:

Bishop at Bell 1: May this signal, O Lord, be sanctified and consecrated.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

In honour of Saint Michael, Peace to thee.

Sancte Michael ora pro nobis

After each baptism while the Bishop moves between the bells, the Choir will repeat the 'Blessing of the Bells' litany and antiphon in the form:

Choir: Sancte Michael ora pro nobis

Sonate super urbem Londinii et trans flumen Tamesis

Bishop at Bell 2: May this signal, O Lord, be sanctified and consecrated.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

In honour of Saint Margaret, Peace to thee.

Sancta Margareta ora pro nobis

Bishop at Bell 3: May this signal, O Lord, be sanctified and consecrated.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

In honour of Saint Thomas of Canterbury, Peace to thee.

Sancte Thomas Cantuarensis ora pro nobis

Bishop at Bell 4: May this signal, O Lord, be sanctified and consecrated.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

In honour of Saint Mary, Peace to thee.

Sancta Maria ora pro nobis

Bishop at Bell 5: May this signal, O Lord, be sanctified and consecrated.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

In honour of Saint Cedd, Peace to thee.

Sancte Cedd ora pro nobis

Bishop at Bell 6: May this signal, O Lord, be sanctified and consecrated.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

In honour of Saint Edward the Confessor, Peace to thee.

Sancte Edwardus Confessor ora pro nobis

Bishop at Bell 7: May this signal, O Lord, be sanctified and consecrated.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

In honour of Saint Dunstan, Peace to thee.

Sancte Dunstan ora pro nobis

Bishop at Bell 8: May this signal, O Lord, be sanctified and consecrated.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

In honour of Saint John the Baptist, Peace to thee.

Sancte Johannes Baptiste ora pro nobis

Bishop at Bell 9: May this signal, O Lord, be sanctified and consecrated.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

In honour of Saint Erkenwald, Peace to thee.

Sancte Erkenwald ora pro nobis

Bishop at Bell 10: May this signal, O Lord, be sanctified and consecrated.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

In honour of Saint Paul, Peace to thee.

Sancte Paulus ora pro nobis

Bishop at Bell 11: May this signal, O Lord, be sanctified and consecrated.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

In honour of Saint Mellitus, Peace to thee.

Sancte Mellitus ora pro nobis

Bishop at Bell 12: May this signal, O Lord, be sanctified and consecrated.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

In honour of Saint Magnus, Peace to thee.

Sancte Magnus ora pro nobis

After the tenor, the Bishop returns to his place, and prays:

Bishop: Let us pray.

Almighty, Eternal God, Who, by the sounding of trumpets before the Ark of the Covenant, didst cause to tumble down the stone walls within which the army of the enemy was entrenched, do Thou pour out upon these bells a heavenly benediction, so that at their sound, the fiery darts of the enemy, lightning strokes, hail storms and the damage of tempests may be driven far away, and to the prophet's question: What ailed thee, O thou sea, that thou didst flee, being driven back in their movements as was the River Jordan, they may give answer: At the presence of the Lord, the earth was moved, at the presence of the God of Jacob: Who turned the rock into pools of water, and the stony hill into fountains of waters. Wherefore, not to us, O Lord, not to us, but to Thy name give glory, for Thy mercy. And thus when these vessels here present, like the other vessels of the altar, are touched with Holy Chrism, anointed with Holy Oil, may those whosoever assemble at their call be free from all the temptations of the enemy, and may they always follow the teachings of Catholic faith. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, Thy Son, Who liveth and reigneth in the unity of the Holy Ghost, world without end. Amen.

#### THE INCENSATION OF THE BELLS

A touch of "Stedman Cinques" will be rung on Handbells by Past Masters of the Ancient Society of College Youths.

During the ringing, the Bishop will clean his hands and put incense into the chafing dish. He will then take the thurible and move among the bells, censing their exteriors. He will be followed by two priests who will place the chafing dish under each bell to cense their interiors.

Almighty Ruler, Christ, Who in the flesh which Thou didst assume, wert asleep in the boat, when the rising tempest disturbed the sea, which directly at Thy awakening and command did fall, kindly aid Thy people in their needs, pour out upon these bells the dew of Thy Holy Spirit, so that at their sound the enemy of the good may always flee, the Christian people may be invited to faith, the hostile army may be struck with terror; may Thy people summoned together by these bells be comforted in the Lord, and, delighted, as with David's harp, may the Holy Spirit come down from above. And even as whilst Samuel was sacrificing the suckling lamb as a holocaust to the King of the Eternal Empire, the noise of the rushing winds drove away the multitude of his adversaries: so in like manner, when the sound of these vessels pierce the clouded skies, may angelic hands preserve the assembly of Thy Church; may everlasting protection save the fruits of those who believe, their souls and their bodies. Through Thee, O Christ Jesus, Who with God the Father liveth and reigneth in the unity of the same Holy Ghost, God, world without end. Amen.



The bells were cast at the Whitechapel Bell Foundry between Nov 2008 & Jan 2009. The clock bell was cast at Whitechapel by Charles & George Mears & restored during 2008.

In the weeks after this service, the bellframe will be built and the bells hung therein. The first public ringing will be after the 11am Mass on Easter Day, to which you are all invited. There will be a service to formally dedicate the ringing of the bells and celebrate the completion of the project later in the year.

These bells replace a ring of 10 bells which were removed from the tower in 1940 and scrapped in 1976. The details of these bells were as follows:

# THE NAMES OF THE BELLS

Each bell is named after a Saint who is connected with the Church, the Parish or London. The inscription at the head of each bell represents a petition to the named saint to pray for whoever hears the sound of that bell. It is a formula that has been used on bells for over 700 years. So the inscription "Sancte Michael ora pro nobis" is translated "St Michael, pray for us", etc.

| Treble | St Michael              | Named after the parish of St Michael, Crooked Lane, which was one of the parishes merged with St Magnus when that church was demolished in 1831. St Michael's was the Livery Church of the Plumbers' Company. |

| 2      | St Margaret             | Named after the parish of St Margaret, New Fish Street. The church was destroyed in the Great Fire of London, never rebuilt, and the parish was merged with that of St Magnus.                                |
| 3      | St Thomas of Canterbury | Named after the chapel that used to stand in<br>the middle of the River Thames on London<br>Bridge.   |
| 4      | St Mary                 | Our Lady  |
| 5      | St Cedd                 | Named after the Bishop of London, 658-664.  |

| 10     | St Paul                 | Named after the Patron Saint of the Diocesan Cathedral.   |
| 11     | St Mellitus             | Named after the first post-Augustinian Bishop of London, 604-658, Later Archbishop of Canterbury.   |
| Tenor  | St Magnus               | Named after the Patron Saint of this church.  |
