East window has three lancets of stained glass. In chancel frescoes by William Yeames, R.A. (a churchwarden). Organ by Gray & Davison; two Georgian chairs in sanctuary. Beadles staff from reign of William and Mary. Clock in west gallery 1785 by William Dutton. Two bells, one from medieval church (1760) and one from Georgian church (1782).
