Peal of Grandsire Triples on Tuesday 17th September 1935 for the conclusion of several years' hard work in getting the old six bells rehung, retuned and augmented to eight. Peal on 17th September 1985 marked the 50th anniversary *Ringing world* October 11th 1985 p. 872.

16/11/1891 Rev W H Peers paid £1-1-0 for two bell ropes Whitechapel Foundry day book 196/97

24/01/1901 Rev W H Peers per Mr J Furness conductor of the ringers paid £1 10s. for 6 pairs muffles. Whitechapel day book 199/97

A large proportion of the cost borne by Mr Blackwell of Crosse & Blackwell. First peal in1901. In the 1920s a new young band was formed under the leadership of Gilbert Goodship which included Elsie K Fulton and H George Hart. The band originally had two practices: one for the girls and one for the boys. The girls learned Stedman while the boys learned Plain Bob. In the 1930s the ringers raised enough finance to pay for two new trebles. Elsie and George were in the celebratory peal of Grandsire Triples on 17th September 1935. *Ringing world* March 28th 1980 p.268

As part of the patronal festival celebrations in 1981 the tower was open to visitors. A closed-circuit television camera was set up so visitors could view from a set in the ringing chamber the motion of a bell being rung and the ringer simultaneously. *Ringing world* November 27th 1981 p. 1035.
