RULES.

I.—The Association shall be called "THE MIDDLESEX COUNTY ASSOCIATION AND LONDON DIOCESAN GUILD OF CHANGE-RINGERS." It was formed on June 7th, 1897, by a union of the Middlesex Association and the South and West Middlesex Guild, and these Societies are hereinafter known as the North and East, and South and West Districts of the County Association.

II.—Its objects are (1) the recognition of the true position of Ringers as Church Officials; (2) the due care and use of Church Bells and Belfries; and (3) the cultivation of the Art of Change-Ringing.

III.—The government of the Association shall be vested in a Committee (hereinafter referred to as the Central Committee) consisting of the following members, of whom five shall form a quorum, viz. :—

- (a) The Bishop of the Diocese, who, being a member, shall be ex-Officio Patron of the Association.
- (b) The President, Master, Secretaries and Treasurer of the Association.
- (c) The Vice-Presidents, Masters, Treasurers and Secretaries of each District of the Association.
- (d) Three Members elected annually by each District, as hereinafter provided. The President, Master, Secretary and Treasurer of the Association shall retire annually at the Annual General Meeting, but shall be eligible for re-election, provided always that the District Secretaries for the time being may, if thought fit, be at the same time Joint Secretaries of the Association.

IV.—The Association shall consist of Honorary and Ringing Members. Honorary Members shall subscribe not less than 5s. annually, or by a donation of not less than £1 is. become Life Members. Such Members may be admitted by the Secretaries at any time. Ringing Members shall pay an Annual Subscription of 1s. 6d., and all subscriptions shall become due on January 1st in each year. A Life Subscription of 5s. may, however, be accepted from non-resident Members in lieu of the annual payment of 1s. 6d.

V.—The following expenses shall be paid by the Treasurer of the Association out of the moneys to be remitted to him by the Treasurer of each District, as hereinafter provided, viz. :—

- (a) The expenses of the Annual Meeting.
- (b) The fees and expenses of representatives of the Central Council.
- (c) The travelling expenses of the Central Committee.
- (d) The cost of printing the Annual Report.
- (e) Postage, Stationery, and other incidental expenses.

VI.—No person shall be admitted as a Ringing Member if he belongs to a band, till he be certified by the captain of his band to be a change-ringer or desirous of learning change-ringing—or if he does not belong to a band, till he be recommended to the Central Committee by two Ringing Members of the Association; but any person duly certified or recommended as aforesaid, shall be admitted as a Ringing Member at any General or District Meeting of the Association.

VII.—The Annual General Meeting of the Association shall be held on the Saturday in Easter week, for the purpose of electing officers, transacting business, and for united practice in change-ringing. At such Meeting a report of proceedings, and a statement of accounts shall be presented, and the place of the next Annual General Meeting fixed. All other General Meetings may be arranged by the Central Committee, and the times and places of ensuing District Meetings shall be arranged by the District Secretaries, as empowered by a majority of Members present at the last District Meeting held.

VIII.—That any person wishing to attempt a peal may be proposed, seconded and elected in the tower, provided there be a majority of members present. The conductor of the peal shall be responsible for collecting the subscription of the newly-elected member previously to the attempt being made, and shall at once report the election to the Secretary in whose District the peal is attempted, in order that the same may be ratified at the next District Meeting.*

IX.—Members whose subscriptions are more than one year in arrear, shall be deemed to have withdrawn from the Association.

X.—The chief endeavour of the Association being to instil greater reverence for God's House and worship among its members, any member misconducting himself may be dismissed at the discretion of the Central Committee, who shall report the same to the Annual General Meeting, and, in the event of his dismissal, such member shall forfeit any payment which he may have made to the Association.

XI.—No alteration in or addition to these Rules shall be made except at an Annual General or Special Meeting of the Association, and notice of any proposed addition or alteration, or of any motion relating to any other matter in connection with the Association, must be sent in writing at least twenty-one days before one of such meetings.

NOTICE.—The Central Committee will be happy to assist the Clergy in framing Rules for the proper management of their Ringers and Belfries.

RULES FOR THE DISTRICT SOCIETIES.

I.—Each District Society shall hold a meeting not later than the second Saturday in February in each year for the election of its Officers and representatives on the Central Committee of the Association, and shall be at liberty to manage its own business, collect its own subscriptions, and publish its separate Balance Sheets.*

II.—The District Secretaries shall receive all subscriptions in their Districts, and remit them to the Treasurer. They shall also satisfy themselves, by personal inspection or otherwise, as to the state of Belfries and Bands in their Districts, and make a yearly report for presentation to the Central Committee.

III.—The Treasurer of each District shall remit to the Treasurer of the Association 70 per cent. of the subscriptions received by him from his District Secretary, the remainder of such subscriptions being retained by the District for its own use.

IV.—Each band of Ringers in the Association shall appoint a Local Secretary, who shall collect the subscriptions, and with whom the General Secretaries shall correspond.

V.—There shall be a Committee in each District, consisting of (a) the representatives of the District on the Central Committee of the Association, and (b) one representative from each tower in the District in union with the Association. These Committees shall meet from time to time for the transaction of any business affecting the District not provided for in the foregoing Rules.*

VI.—Bands desirous of employing an instructor should apply to one or other of the District Secretaries, who will endeavour, so far as funds permit, to meet their wishes.

REPORT, 1925.

LAST year we commented briefly on the necessity for regular practices, especially at those churches where lack of facilities for practice had caused ringers to become slack. We urged our clergy to set aside a definite night which the ringers could consider their own, and pointed out that unless ringers had practice, the Sunday ringing would suffer. We hope that our few words on this subject have not been entirely without good results, but there are still some of our towers where we feel there is room for improvement. Without practice we cannot train young ringers, and the need for a continual supply of recruits to our ranks is ever present. Some of our bands have had no additions to their numbers for years, and we would urge the leaders of our towers always to be mindful of the necessity of providing for the days ahead, when age causes members to fall out of the ranks. Even apart from the latter as a motive, it is for the good of ringing in general, and for the Association in particular, that we should always be on the look-out for somebody whom we can teach to ring. In these days of the broadcasting of ringing it should be easy to get people quickly interested, and we should make the most of our opportunities.

There is another matter that gives us cause for concern. The state of the bells in several of our towers is far from satisfactory. Some of them have been going badly for years, and urgently need the attentions of the bell-hanger, but for various reasons nothing is done. If bells go badly it is essential that they should not be neglected, and we would urge those responsible to do all that is possible to have the bells in their charge kept in good going condition. There are far too many peals of bells which to-day are never rung, simply because of neglect in the past, and it is our duty to see that the bells handed down to us are left in good order for those who come after us. A card of instructions, drawn up by the ringers' Central Council, and containing expert advice on the care of bells, has recently been distributed in all our towers, and we hope that our bands will see that the bells in their charge are properly looked after. Ringers should also see that the attention of the clergy and Parochial Church Councils is continually drawn to cases of badly going bells, with a view to their having proper and expert attention.

The 28th Annual General Meeting, which was held at Southgate on April 18th, was attended by some 75 members. The preacher was

the Rev. S. F. L. Bernays, Rector of Finchley, who gave an inspiring address, basing his remarks on the dangers confronting all workers in the church, from the clergy down to the choir, bellringers, and other lay workers, viz., that of forgetting the real nature of their calling. It was quite easy for them all to forget that their work was that of praising God. Even the clergy, in repeating the same services week after week, found it easy to forget, and the preacher urged his hearers to try to bear in mind, during the ringing of the bells, that they were just as much praising God as were the clergy and congregation.

After the service, tea was partaken of, and subsequently the usual business meeting was held. With the exception of Mr. T. Beadle, who had expressed his wish to be relieved of office, the whole of the retiring officers were re-elected. Mr. C. S. Bird, of Heston, was appointed vice-president in lieu of Mr. Beadle.

Amongst other important business transacted was an alteration to Rule VIII. and the deletion of Rule XI. The attention of members was drawn to an improved Association certificate, for price of which see contents page of this report.

Besides the Southgate bells, those at Wood Green were open for the use of members, and during the day some excellent touches in many methods were rung on ten, eight and six bells.

The meetings held in the districts were again very satisfactorily attended. In the N. and E. District meetings were held at Edmonton, Finchley, Barnet and Hadley, Northaw, Stanmore and Harrow Weald, Willesden, Hornsey and Wood Green, and at South Hackney; whilst a mid-week practice meeting was held at Tottenham in the summer. The methods rung at these meetings usually included many of the more difficult, and, as the attendances reached the excellent average of 35, which is even higher than that of last year, it is to be inferred that the meetings are becoming increasingly popular as a means of obtaining good practice in ringing.

The meetings in the S. and W. District were held at Acton, Isleworth, Chiswick, Heston, Ealing (Christ Church and St. Mary's), Ruislip, Harlington, Sunbury, Staines, Norwood Green, and at Hillingdon (St. John's). Here, too, the attendances were good, reaching the fine average of 31, whilst the ringing reached a higher standard than in 1924, Surprise methods being very popular, which is a sign of good progress.

Mention must also be made of the joint meeting of the N. and E. District and the S.W. Division of the Essex Association, which was held at Waltham Abbey on Saturday, August 8th. Several officers and some 50 members of the two societies were present. Mr. C. H. Howard, Master of the Essex Association, presided at tea, and afterwards expressed his great pleasure at the success of the meeting. Underlying these joint meetings is the idea of furthering the brotherhood of ringers, and we sincerely hope that more of them will be held in the future.

Our present membership is 759, an increase of ten compared with last year. In the N. and E. District we elected 2 honorary and 38 ringing members, whilst in the S. and W. District 3 honorary and 36 ringing members were admitted. The continued increase in our membership is a matter for congratulation; but the losses of members by resignation, or by their falling into arrears with subscriptions, is to be deplored, and we trust that every effort will be made by masters of local bands to stimulate interest in ringing amongst their members. A standing still attitude is never a good one, and attempts to improve on what we have already done is the only sure way of retaining ringers in our belfries.

During the year the hand of death has taken three of our members from us. Edgar Wightman, of Uxbridge, died on February 15th at the age of 50. He had only recently rejoined the Association on moving into the county, but had been a member in our earlier days. He was a good ringer and a capable conductor, and rang 31 peals for the Association, having conducted five of them. He took part in the first handbell peal of Cinques rung by our members.

On June 14th the death of Daniel Lovett occurred, in his 73rd year. He had occupied the position of sexton and verger at St. Sepulchre's, Holborn, for upwards of 45 years, and during his quarter century of membership had proved a loyal friend to us. He did not greatly aspire to peal ringing, but on one occasion he rang the tenor at his own church to a peal of Stedman Caters with this Association.

Herbert Baker, of Hertford, died on December 28th, aged 62. He had been a member since 1902, and had rung three peals with us. He served in the late war in France, and was second in command of his battalion of the Herts Regiment. He served the public at Hertford in many capacities, being in turn councillor, alderman, and mayor.

Turning to the peals, we note a considerable reduction in the number rung during 1925, but as we have no record of the number of attempts that have been made we are unable to say whether the reason for the decrease is that fewer have been attempted, or that a larger number than usual have been lost. As, however, peal ringing, if not the whole object of our existence, is a sign of our liveliness as an organisation, we hope that members will put their best into this branch of our activities. It is in this direction that interest among the younger members may be stimulated.

The total number of peals rung was 60, and 178 members took part in them, 26 sharing in the conducting. Thirteen members rang their first peals, and 54 their "firsts" in a new method or on a different number of bells. Among the latter were three of Cambridge Maximus, one of Cambridge Royal, one of Stedman Cinques, three of Bristol, and two of London. Seven members rang their first peals of Bob Royal, two their "firsts" of Stedman Caters, and six of Stedman Triples. Among those who rang their first peals was Master C. T. W. Coles, aged 14, son of the joint hon. secretary,

who rang the treble to Grandsire Caters at St. Mary's, Walthamstow, on February 28th. Master Howard Mackman, also at the age of 14, accomplished a fine performance in ringing his first peal of Stedman Triples at Acton on June 10th. Miss M. Ringrose rang her first peal at Burnham-on-Crouch on August 29th. Mrs. R. F. Deal rang her first peal of Cambridge Maximus at Waltham Abbey on January 31st, and her first of Bristol Surprise at Cubitt Town on October 17th; whilst Miss P. Moss accomplished Double Norwich at Willesden on January 13th, and Bob Royal at Hillingdon on December 26th. Several others of our lady members are well to the front in the list of peal ringers, and it is worthy of notice that on January 20th, 1926, ten members of the Ladies' Guild rang a peal of Stedman Caters at St. Clement Danes' Church, the whole of the band being also members of this Association. Messrs. A. F. Putland and A. Cross have the honour of appearing in the list of conductors for the first time, the former actually calling his own first peal. Mr. R. Sanders rang his 500th peal during the year. To all of these we extend our heartiest congratulations.

Of the peals themselves, 59 were rung on tower-bells in 33 different towers, and one on handbells. Four tower-bell peals were rung with half-muffled clappers as a token of respect to her late Most Gracious Majesty Queen Alexandra, at Stanmore, Heston, Edmonton and Bishopsgate, whilst several quarter-peals were rung at other towers as part of the national mourning. At the meeting of the S. and W. District held at Hillingdon on November 21st the bells were rung half-muffled. A vote of condolence with the King and Queen, passed at this meeting, was most graciously acknowledged by their Majesties.

One outstanding performance was accomplished, i.e., a peal of 7,392 Cambridge Surprise Maximus, which was rung at St. Mary-le-Bow on December 19th. This is the longest peal yet rung in the method on twelve bells, and also the longest length in any method rung on the bells in the tower.

The quarter-peal list is appended, but we cannot guarantee that it is complete. It will be noted that the band at Ealing (St. Mary's) heads the list with 32 quarter-peals, and that Tottenham and Acton take second and third places with 20 and 17 respectively. Besides these quarter-peals, several of our six-bell bands have scored 720's of Doubles and Minor, notably at Stamford Hill, Finchley, Hornsey and Northaw, but no true record of them is available.

So far as bell restoration is concerned, there is little to report. At Twickenham, Messrs. Mears and Stainbank have returned and rehung the bells in new gudgeons and bearings, with very satisfactory results, whilst John Taylor and Co. are at present engaged in re-hanging the bells at All Saints', Poplar, in an entirely new frame. The scheme to add two trebles to the existing peal of eight at Isleworth is maturing. About a third of the sum of £180 required has been collected. A small committee has been formed to carry the matter to a successful conclusion, and we trust that our members will give them all the financial help they can.

Before closing, it is our pleasant duty to record our grateful thanks to Mr. T. Beadle on his retirement from the office of District

Vice-President. An original member of the Association, he was one of those mainly instrumental in bringing about the amalgamation of the two district societies. He has served the society in many ways, and was for some years Master of the S. and W. District. He has our sincere thanks for the good work he has done for the Association, and our good wishes for many more years of happiness amongst his ringing friends.

Mr. G. B. Lucas, too, retired from office last year, although his interest in the Association is in no way lessened. An unfortunate accident whilst cycling was the cause of his giving up ringing, and he resigned the office of Master of the N. and E. District, which he had held since 1922. Prior to that date he had been a member of the Central Committee since the commencement of the society. We thank him for his many years of service, and trust that he will fully recover from his unfortunate accident, and may again be able to take an active part in the work of the Association.

Quite a number of our members deserve our thanks for their work as voluntary instructors, among them being Miss P. Moss, Messrs. A. W. Coles, F. Corke, F. A. Edwards, R. A. Fardon, F. W. Goodfellow, J. H. Hunnisett, J. R. Mackman, J. Milner and N. A. Tomlinson. Without such assistance as is given by these members, the Association would quickly come to an end.

We also wish to acknowledge the invaluable services rendered to the Association by the joint hon. secretaries. A great deal of their work is done silently and unseen; we can best show our appreciation of their efforts by supporting them at the Association meetings and by prompt payment of subscriptions.
