EALING, St Mary

There were five bells in 1552. James Bagley recast the tenor, c1718. It is believed that R Phelps cast the  $16\frac{1}{2}$ " diameter bell of about 1cwt c1729. It was hung as a clock bell in 1754 when a cupola was added to the tower. This bell no longer exists.

During the period of the marriage celebrations for Frederick, Prince of Wales, who was married on April 25<sup>th</sup> 1736, someone carried off the treble of the old five bells, which were standing on the ground, and used it as a punch bowl during the festivities.

Several peals had been rung before nine members of A Friendly Society rang a peal on Sunday May 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1841 of 5040 changes of Grandsire Tripples (sic) in three hours one minute by: R Haworth, G Stockham, C Balle, R Graham, W Jeffrys, T Tolladay (conductor), T Phillips and two ringers who were needed to ring the tenor - J Durrant and W Hill. At the time of peal The Revd. J Smith was the Vicar and Samuel Knevitt and Thomas Layton the Churchwardens.
