RULES.

I.—The Association shall be called "The Middlesex County Association and London Diocesan Guild of Change-Ringers." It was formed on June 7th, 1897, by a union of the Middlesex Association and the South and West Middlesex Guild, and these Societies are hereinafter known as the North and East, and South and West Districts of the County Association.

II.—Its objects are (1) the recognition of the true position of Ringers as Church Officials; (2) the due care and use of Church Bells and Belfries; and (3) the cultivation of the art of Change-Ringing.

III.—The government of the Association shall be vested in a Committee (hereinafter referred to as the Central Committee) consisting of the following members, of whom five shall form a quorum, viz:—

- (a) The Bishop of the Diocese, who, being a member, shall be ex-Officio Patron of the Association.
- (b) The President, Master, Secretaries and Treasurer of the Association.
- (c) The Vice-Presidents, Masters, Treasurers and Secretaries of each District of the Association.
- (d) Three members elected annually by each District, as hereinafter provided. The President, Master, Secretary and Treasurer of the Association shall retire annually at the Annual General Meeting, but shall be eligible for re-election, provided always that the District Secretaries for the time being may, if thought fit, be at the same time Joint Secretaries of the Association.

IV.—The Association shall consist of Honorary and Ringing Members. Honorary Members shall subscribe not less than 5s. annually, or by a donation of not less than £1 1s. become Life Members. Such Members may be admitted by the Secretaries at any time. Ringing Members shall pay an Annual Subscription of 1s. 6d., and all subscriptions shall become due on January 1st in each year. A Life Subscription of 5s. may, however, be accepted from non-resident Members in lieu of the annual payment of 1s. 6d.

V.—The following expenses shall be paid by the Treasurer of the Association out of the moneys to be remitted to him by the Treasurer of each District, as hereinafter provided, viz:—

- (a) The expenses of the Annual Meeting.
- (b) The fees and expenses of representatives of the Central Council.
- (c) The travelling expenses of the Central Committee.
- (d) The cost of printing the Annual Report.
- (e) Postage, Stationery, and other incidental expenses.

VI.—No person shall be admitted as a Ringing Member if he belongs to a band, till he be certified by the captain of his band to be a change-ringer or desirous of learning change-ringing—or if he does not belong to a band, till he be recommended to the Central Committee by two Ringing Members of the Association; but any person duly certified or recommended as aforesaid, shall be admitted as a Ringing Member at any General or District Meeting of the Association.

VII.—The Annual General Meeting of the Association shall be held on the second or third Saturday after Easter, for the purpose of electing officers, transacting business, and for united practice in change-ringing. At such Meeting a report of proceedings and a statement of accounts shall be presented, and the place of the next Annual General Meeting fixed. All other General Meetings may be arranged by the Central Committee, and the times and places of ensuing District Meetings shall be arranged by the District Secretaries, as empowered by a majority of Members present at the last District Meeting held.

VIII.—That any person wishing to attempt a peal may be proposed, seconded and elected in the tower, provided there be a majority of members present. The conductor of the peal shall be responsible for collecting the subscription of the newly-elected member previously to the attempt being made, and shall at once report the election to the Secretary in whose District the peal is attempted, in order that the same may be ratified at the next District Meeting.

IX.—Members whose subscriptions are more than one year in arrear, shall be deemed to have withdrawn from the Association.

X.—The chief endeavour of the Association being to instil greater reverence for God's House and worship among its members, any member misconducting himself may be dismissed at the discretion of the Central Committee, who shall report the same to the Annual General Meeting, and, in the event of his dismissal, such member shall forfeit any payment which he may have made to the Association.

XI.—That this Association be affiliated to the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers, and loyally abide by the Rules and Decisions thereof.

XII.—No alteration in or addition to these Rules shall be made except at an Annual General or Special Meeting of the Association, and notice of any proposed addition or alteration, or of any motion relating to any other matter in connection with the Association, must be sent in handwriting at least twenty-one days before one of such meetings.

NOTICE.—The Central Committee will be happy to assist the Clergy in framing Rules for the proper management of their Ringers and Belfries.

RULES FOR THE DISTRICT SOCIETIES.

I.—Each District Society shall hold a meeting not later than the second Saturday in February in each year for the election of its Officers and representatives on the Central Committee of the Association, and shall be at liberty to manage its own business, collect its own subscriptions, and publish its separate Balance Sheets.

II.—The District Secretaries shall receive all subscriptions in their Districts, and remit them to the Treasurer. They shall also satisfy themselves, by personal inspection or otherwise, as to the state of Belfries and Bands in their Districts, and make a yearly report for presentation to the Central Committee.

III.—The Treasurer of each District shall remit to the Treasurer of the Association 60 per cent. of the subscriptions received by him from his District Secretary, the remainder of such subscriptions being retained by the District for its own use.

IV.—Each band of Ringers in the Association shall appoint a Local Secretary, who shall collect the subscriptions, and with whom the General Secretaries shall correspond.

V.—There shall be a Committee in each District, consisting of (a) the representatives of the District on the Central Committee of the Association, and (b) one representative from each tower in the District in union with the Association. These Committees shall meet from time to time for the transaction of any business affecting the District not provided for in the foregoing Rules.

VI.—Bands desirous of employing an instructor should apply to one or other of the District Secretaries, who will endeavour, so far as funds permit, to meet their wishes.

IMPORTANT.

REPORT, 1937.

THE year 1937 saw the completion of the 40th year of our existence as a county organisation, and it was therefore appropriate that the annual general meeting should be held in the centre of London. This took place at St. Giles, Cripplegate, on Saturday, April 17th, when upwards of 100 members and friends attended the service held in that church, and listened to an inspiring sermon preached by the Rev. E. G. Turner (Vicar).

Subsequently, at the business meeting, with the President in the chair, a resolution was passed expressing loyalty to Their Majesties upon the Accession to the Throne of His Majesty King George VI, which was duly forwarded to the Private Secretary, by whom it was acknowledged and sent to the Home Secretary for submission to His Majesty. This was subsequently acknowledged by Sir John Simon.

Before the ordinary business of the meeting, a presentation was made to Mr. C. T. Coles in recognition of his 25 years work as joint honorary secretary of the Association. The gift took the form of a handsome gold watch, suitably inscribed. Mrs. Coles was also the recipient of a very nice handbag. Both presentations were made by the President, who intimated that the balance of the fund would be given to Mr. Coles in the form of a cheque when it was closed.

After the formal business of the meeting had been completed, a resolution congratulating the Ancient Society of College Youths on the attainment of the tercentenary of that society, was passed, together with an expression of good wishes for their future success.

On behalf of the Central Committee it was stated that a sub-committee had been appointed to consider the revision of the rules, and the meeting was asked to agree that the new draft rules should be presented to the districts at their respective annual meetings. This was assented to.

The usual long programme of district meetings was arranged. In the North and East District the churches at Kilburn, Edmonton, Pinner, Harrow Weald, Hendon, Willesden, Finchley and Tottenham were visited, the attendances averaging 33. The meeting at Edmonton was arranged jointly with a meeting of the Ladies' Guild. In addition, the usual joint meeting with the Herts. Association was arranged, it being held at Barnet on July 24th, and a very successful meeting of four associations took place at Ley-

tonstone, where the William Pye memorial bells are situated, on October 2nd.

The South and West District meetings were held at Isleworth, Chiswick, Stanwell, Sunbury, Harlington, Ruislip, Twickenham and Hillingdon West, with an average attendance of 29, a result that is disappointing. On the other hand the two joint meetings with neighbouring associations were very well attended. These meetings took place at Staines and Hillingdon in August and October respectively.

It is to be regretted that in each district the attendances were much below the average of the previous year. Meetings are an outward expression of the society's work, giving opportunities of good practice for ringers of all stages of ability, and it is particularly disheartening to those responsible for arranging them when only a comparative few members attend. If every member made a point of attending at least one meeting per year, what a difference it would make—especially to their own ringing.

During the year we elected 1 honorary and 48 ringing members, but this addition has been more than offset by losses through death, resignations, and non-payment of subscriptions. We regret that 12 members died during 1937; a full list of these will be found in the appropriate pages of this report. Losses through non-payment of subscriptions reach an alarming figure, especially in the South and West District, and consequently our membership shows a considerable decrease, the total now being 867.

The continued decrease in the membership in the South and West District, mainly through the non-payment of subscriptions already referred to, is a matter for serious concern, and it is hoped that an extra effort will be made this year to collect these arrears. The loss of income is reflected in the continually decreasing balance in the district accounts.

We deeply deplore the loss, by death, of William Henry Hollier, our treasurer, who died on December 29th. Mr. Hollier was honorary secretary of the S. & W. District, and joint honorary secretary of the Association, from 1921 until 1931. During this period he did not miss a meeting of the district, an example of keenness worthy of record. He was mainly responsible for the augmentation of the peal at Isleworth, and in spite of many discouragements he persevered, until in June 1931 he had the satisfaction of seeing the new bells dedicated by the Bishop of Kensington. On his retirement from secretarial duties, he became honorary treasurer of the Association. He represented the Association on the Central Council from 1924 until his death. At his funeral on January 4th, 1938, the Association was strongly represented, and four officers rang a course of Grandsire Triples on handbells at the graveside, whilst a wreath was sent as a mark of the members' sympathy and esteem.

To turn to a brighter side, we are glad to be able to report that the new bands formed at Bethnal Green and Stamford Hill continue to make satisfactory progress, and before long we hope to be able to say that a start with an almost entirely new band has been made at St. Matthews, Upper Clapton.

The chief event of 1937, the Coronation of Their Majesties King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, was the occasion of a great amount of ringing. From reports received it was evident that most of our bells were rung, quite a large number of quarter-peals were recorded, and in all seven peals were rung in honour of this great national occasion.

Apart from this, however, 1937 was a disappointment as regards peal ringing. Indeed, the total of 35 was the lowest since 1919. Of this total, one was rung on handbells, and 34 on tower-bells at 21 different churches. There were 15 conductors, whilst 130 members took part in the peals. Seven members rang their first peals; 42 their first peals in a new method, or on a different number of bells; whilst there were five first peals of Surprise, two of Bristol, 9 of Yorkshire Royal, and 3 of Yorkshire Major:

Mr. W. G. Wilson conducted his first peal of Spliced Surprise Major in four methods at St. Mary's, Acton, on February 27th.

The members ringing their first peals were Messrs. D. E. Rowles, J. W. Stewart, S. Cooter, jun., and V. L. P. Davis, all of Sunbury; Mr. C. R. Raine (Edinburgh); Mr. D. E. Cattell (Stanmore); and Mr. G. W. Morris (Heston).

The list of quarter-peals rung is very much the same as in 1936, and can easily be improved upon. We do, however, congratulate the Southgate band upon the variety of methods rung.

The annual record of bell restoration work is more extensive than in 1936. At Stanwell, Messrs. Mears and Stainbank have added a treble bell to make a peal of six, and have rehung the five original bells in new bearings. The same firm is now engaged in cleaning and retuning the heavy peal of eight bells at St. George-in-the-East, which are being rehung with modern fittings in a strengthened frame. Messrs. J. Taylor & Co. have made extensive alterations at Northaw, where the peal of six has been lowered and now hangs at the level of the old ringing chamber. The bells are now rung from the floor of the church. The peal of five bells at Shepperton has been retuned and rehung, the fittings repaired and equipped with ball-bearings, and the frame strengthened. This work has been carried out by Messrs. Gillett and Johnston.

We extend to our President our most sincere congratulations on his appointment as a Prebendary of St. Paul's Cathedral,

On July 30th the peal tablet erected in the belfry at St. Mary-le-Bow as a memorial to the late William Pye, was unveiled and dedicated. This tablet records a peal of 7392 Cambridge Surprise Maximus rung on December 19th, 1925, and it contains the following footnote: "This tablet is erected by the Ringing Exercise to the memory of the conductor, William Pye, who died on March 8th, 1935."

Mr. F. W. Goodfellow, who has been joint hon. secretary of the Association and hon. secretary of the S. & W. District since 1931, has retired from office. For his excellent work, which he always did with the greatest enthusiasm and self-sacrifice, we offer him our sincere thanks. His successor, Mr. J. E. Lewis Cockey, will, we feel sure, carry on the work well, and the best reward we can give Mr. Goodfellow for his great services to the Association is to give his successor our utmost support.

The new draft rules of the Association are already in the hands of the members. The necessary resolutions enabling the district funds to be transferred to the Central Fund of the Association, have already been passed, and we most sincerely hope that the new rules, if adopted, will be the means of bringing the two districts much closer together than before, and of giving added strength to the Guild.

In Memoriam.

Members lost to us by death during 1937.

FRANK BOREHAM, High Wycombe.—Died on January 11th. He had been a member since 1927, and rang in six Association peals. He was a safe ringer and good striker.

Rev. E. W. CARPENTER, Stoke-by-Clare, Suffolk.—Died on February 9th, age 81. He joined the Association in 1904, when living at Chertsey. He was successively hon. secretary of the Kent County Association and the Winchester Diocesan Guild, and represented the former Association on the Central Council. Later he became an honorary member of that body. He rang one peal with this Association.

Canon E. CORNWALL-JONES.—Vicar of Ruislip and an hon. member of the Association since 1924. He died on November 13th, at the age of 68.

FREDERICK EDWARDS, Bushey.—Died on May 11th, age 66. He had been a member of the Association since its inception,

and in 1924 he became instructor to the Stanmore band. He did a great deal of good work in this connection, and had the satisfaction of conducting many peals at Stanmore, in which several of his pupils took part. He rang 13 Association peals, of which he conducted nine.

HENRY ARTHUR FOLKARD, Ealing.—Died on August 5th, age 68. He had been a ringer at Ealing for 35 years, and a member of the Association for nearly the whole of that time. He rang 18 peals with us.

WILLIAM HENRY HOLLIER, Chiswick.—Died on December 29th, age 63. He first joined the Association in 1902, continuing in membership until 1910. He again became a member in 1921, serving us faithfully, first as hon. secretary of the S. & W. District and joint hon. secretary of the Association, and later as honorary treasurer. He rang in 99 Association peals. His work for the Association is dealt with more fully in the report.

BENJAMIN JARMAN, Harpenden.—Died on January 14th, age 62. He was President of the Hertfordshire Association in 1926-7, and had been a member of this Association for nine years.

JAMES HENRY LUCAS, Uxbridge.—Died on August 2nd, age 57. He had been a regular service ringer at St. Andrew's, Hillingdon, since he joined the Association in 1924. He rang in 32 Association peals.

Rev. C. F. PEPLOE, Vicar of Christ Church, Southgate.—He became an honorary member in 1909, and always took a keen interest in the affairs of the Association and of his own band. His death occurred in June.

Rev. H. S. T. RICHARDSON, Hereford.—Died on December 23rd, aged 55. Whilst at Cambridge he was for three years master of the Cambridge University Guild. Since 1908 he was an honorary member of the Central Council, and for many years was honorary secretary of the Hereford Diocesan Guild. He joined this Association in 1912, and whilst in a curacy at Camberwell he rang five peals with us.

WILLIAM WEBB, Finchley.—Died on December 25th, age 81.—He was an original member of the Association, and had been connected with ringing at Finchley for 60 years. His long and faithful service earned him the respect of all who knew him. He rang in seven Association peals.

FREDERICK WILFORD, Brampton, Northants.—Died on January 11th, age 66. He joined this Association in 1903, and during his long membership rang in 20 peals. In 1906 he was elected hon. secretary of the old Central Northants Association, and in 1924, when that Association became part of the Peterboro Diocesan Guild, he became ringing master. He had represented these societies on the Central Council since 1904.

CENTRAL COUNCIL NEWS.

THE 45th Annual Meeting of the Council was held in the Chapter House at Canterbury Cathedral on Tuesday, May 18th. All four representatives of this Association attended. In all 95 members of the Council were present.

A telegram was sent to the King containing the following message: "The members of the Central Council of Church Bell-ringers, who represent 21,000 change-ringers, assembled for their annual meeting in the Chapter House, Canterbury Cathedral, wish to repeat to your Majesty the message of congratulation and loyalty which rang out last Wednesday from the church towers of the country.—Edwin H. Lewis, President."

During the afternoon the following reply was received from Buckingham Palace: "President, Central Council of Church Bell-ringers. The King is much gratified to receive your message of congratulation on the occasion of His Majesty's Coronation. I am desired to express his warm thanks to all who joined in these good wishes.—Private Secretary."

The report of the librarian stated that the stocks of "Model Rules for a Local Company" and "Preservation of Bells" were exhausted, and it was decided that these should be reprinted. It was also agreed that the large stock of "The Glossary" should be given free to affiliated societies upon application and payment of carriage.

The Methods Committee asked that the figures of all new methods rung should be forwarded to the Council, together with a record of the performance, and the composition, to enable the register to be kept up to date.

During the discussion on the Towers and Belfries Committee's report, the President gave an interesting dissertation upon the welding of bells. He expressed his opinion that it was useless to weld a bell cracked at the sound bow. He explained the scientific difficulties in the way of successful welding.

In reply to an enquiry about so-called "silencers," the committee expressed the opinion that the "Davis silencers" were worth a trial in towers where it was desired to reduce the sound during practices, etc.

With reference to the insurance of ringers, it was stated that the Ecclesiastical Insurance Company was prepared to insure against accidents to ringers (whether paid or voluntary) in the belfry, and in going to and from ringing, at the rate of one shilling per ringer per annum, with a minimum of ten shillings.

The report on muffled ringing was approved in general outline, and when further information as to local customs has been obtained it will be submitted to the authorities of the Church for their approval.

The following motion was then proposed by Mr. W. G. Wilson, seconded by Mr. E. C. S. Turner, and carried: "That so much of all previous resolutions of the Council as defines or attempts to define what shall be recognised as a peal of Doubles shall be rescinded and the following substituted therefor:—

"Peals of Doubles shall consist of 5040 or more changes rung in:

"(a) True and complete six-scores, without interval between any two six-scores and without rounds or any other row being struck more than once before the next change is made.

"(b) Round blocks consisting of two or more six-scores, provided that each of the six-scores which comprise the round blocks shall be itself a true and complete round block.

"(c) Twelve-scores known as Morris' and Pitman's.

"(d) Combinations of (a), (b) and (c) above or any two of them.

"Peals of Doubles may be rung with or without a covering bell."

The 1938 meeting of the Council will be held at Leeds.
